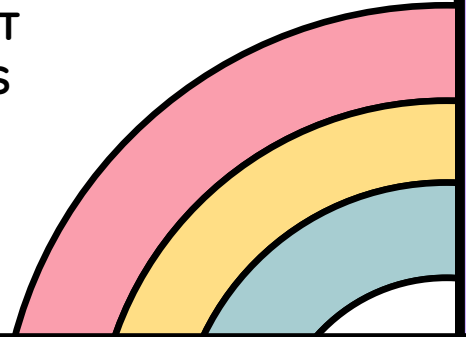


4TH GRADE

BIBLE

- Find a family daily devotional.
- Commit to prioritizing church attendance over the summer.
- Write in a prayer journal every day. Take time each week to look back at your prayers and praise God for the prayers he's answered.
- Pray together as a family before meals.
- Find a service project in your community to complete together.
- Make a skit of your favorite Bible story and perform it for your family.

READING

- Join your local library's reading program
- Set aside daily reading time for the whole family.
- Find a book that's been turned into a movie or show. Read the book with your child and then watch the movie/TV adaptation.
- After finishing a book, create a written or drawn summary for someone who has never read this book before.
- Pick your favorite scene or character from a book and create a 3-D visual.

WRITING

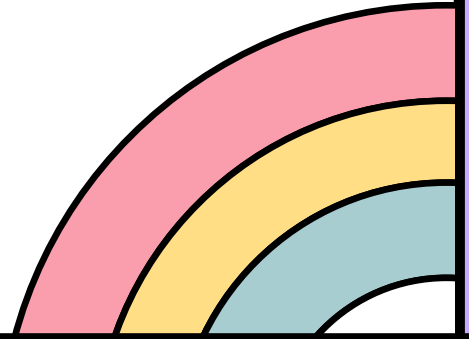
- Write and illustrate your own story. Include dialogue between your characters.
- Going on a vacation? Take pictures, print them, and put them in a photo journal. Write captions for each picture to remind you of your trip.
- Pick your favorite meal and write step-by-step directions on how to make that meal. Try out your directions with a friend or family member.
- Complete word puzzle worksheets/books.

MATH

- **Memorize all multiplication facts through the 12s. You will be expected to have these memorized when starting 4th grade. Make up a game or song to help with the difficult facts.**
- Help cook a meal. Practice doubling or tripling a recipe to work on fractions.
- Set a budget for a grocery trip. While shopping, add up your items to make sure you are staying within your budget.
- Plan your dream vacation. Research the cost of travel, hotels, activities at your destination, and food.

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SCIENCE/SOCIAL STUDIES

- Create a garden in your yard. Choose what type of plants you want to include in your garden. Plan how you will water and care for the plants.
- Visit a state or national park. All 4th graders have free admission to all national parks.
- Make an invention. Find things around your house/yard to create your invention. How will you use this item? What resources do you need? How can you improve your design?

HABITS TO BUILD

- **Daily Routines** - Establish a daily routine for your summer break that includes time with God, time outside, and time reading.
- **Time Management** - Learn to manage tasks over a certain amount of time. Clocks, timers, and checklists are a great resource.
- **Chores** - Chores build personal responsibility. Determine daily and weekly chores you must accomplish.
- **Problem Solving** - Experiencing something difficult? Use the problem-solving skills Mrs. White has taught you to think through solutions before seeking help from an adult.

- State history and the U.S. Constitution, including the Bill of Rights
- American Indian History, cultures, and languages in Ohio
